## A growing success: just take a look at how these FOHC projects are going

The Friends of Hoddles Creek have so far embarked on three major environmental projects – weed control near the junction of Hoddles Creek and Blackleather Creek, roadside planting along Yellowgum Road (with the Shire of Yarra Ranges) and a joint garden project with Hoddles Creek Primary School.

Each of these projects has been underway for some time and we thought we should revisit them to take a look at progress.

### Weeds down but not out

Weed treatment along a 600-700 metre stretch of Hoddles Creek and Blackleather Creek is into its third year and we have seen a dramatic reduction in blackberry and holly infestation. This has meant the return of many understorey plants, especially fern species.

While the overall weed burden is down, regrowth means that the area will need ongoing management to keep the weeds out. The photograph shows one of the large holly trees that has been 'treated' – a tree like this can be the source of hundreds of new plants in the surrounding area.

This project is about to be expanded to take in a further section of Hoddles Creek. This will not only improve more of the stream-front, but will also

reduce the risk of reintroduction of weeds into the area already under management.

### Tree-mendous results at Yellowgum Road

This project started with collection and germination of seeds from indigenous species and has ended with a lush new corridor of trees and understorey plants along a section of Yellowgum Road. Along the way, FOHC members have received invaluable help from the Shire (treeguards, trees, mulch) and Green

Corps volunteers (willing hands to help with mulching and planting).

Two sections have been planted out and a third section is scheduled to be mulched and planted. You can see the impressive results so far in the photo on page 1.

## School planting makes the grade

Following removal of a pine plantation adjacent to Hoddles Creek Primary School, FOHC members worked with the school community to develop a plan for a native garden, with a range of environments, including a frog bog and an outdoor classroom area. With the generous

assistance of local businesses and the Shire, pupils, teachers, parents and FOHC members have completed two stages of the project, with a third planting planned for this month. The first two plantings have taken off, despite the dry summer – you can see just how well in the photograph below.

## Where to from here?

We are very pleased with the work so far completed on these projects, but there is still lots more to do. Our weed clearing project is about to double in size, more sections of Yellowgum Road need to be prepared and planted to complete the wildlife corridor and the school project
